Dorene Dwyer Hammes Media Commons and Café Opens

Thanks to the lead gift from Jerry and Dorene Hammes, the Dorene Dwyer Hammes Media Commons and Café is now open. The area provides students with the resources, technology, and services that allow them to complete their media projects as well as offer an exciting environment in which to study.

The Dorene Dwyer Hammes Media Commons & Café has four new areas: the Multimedia Production Studio, the Coffee Connection, the AV Nook, and the Circulation Hub.

The café has Gloria Jean's coffee, tea, and hot chocolate available for sale (\$1.60). The café is located on the library's first floor across from the Hammes Information Commons (to the left of the circulation area). The café also features 55-inch LED TV airing news programming, newspapers, magazines, comfortable furniture, vhs/dvd/blu-ray players, and is an excellent place to get wireless access.

The multimedia production studio features a green screen, video lighting, and controlled acoustics. A 24" iMac is loaded with Final Cut Express, Premier Pro, and iMovie for video editing, and Garage Band, Audacity, and Sound Booth for audio editing. Analog media (VHS, audiocassette etc.) may be converted to digital form.

Students may check out mini-DV camcorders, digital still cameras, tripods, microphones and digital audio recorders for class or student club projects. IMS offers assistance to students in learning to use the technology and planning projects.

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Electronic Resources News

Two new databases, **Oxford Art Online** & **Oxford Music Online**, provide users access to several art and music reference sources, including Grove Art Online and Grove Music Online. Regularly updated, **Grove Art Online** features over 45,000 signed articles from 6,800 expert contributors and includes over 5,000 searchable and embedded images. **Grove Music Online** is also regularly updated and features over 50,000 signed articles from 6,000 expert contributors and includes 500 Sibeliusenabled audio examples.

Enjoy **Nature Online** in your lab! Nature Online allows readers to enjoy articles ahead of print (AOP), sign up for table of contents e-alerts, listen to weekly podcasts, and view videos of nature authors discussing their research, and much more! JSTOR Facebook Application

Access JSTOR while catching up with family and friends on Facebook! JSTOR now has a Facebook application which allows you to access the Library's subscription to the database from your Facebook profile page. Here's how to use it:

When in facebook, do a search for JSTOR

Choose "JSTOR Search"

It will then ask you for the url for our library proxy server (so that you can use it while off-campus). Our proxy server url is: https://library2.iusb.edu:2443/login?url=. Once you enter the proxy server address, JSTOR Search will then appear on your facebook page.

To use the application, simply type in your search term and hit enter. If you are off-campus the proxy server login screen will appear asking you to type in your IU South Bend login and passphrase. Once you've logged in, your JSTOR results will open up in a new window. From there you can modify your search, go to advanced search, etc.

Many databases are creating facebook applications. Our library will keep you informed of database facebook applications as they become available.



Library Prize for Undergraduate Research

The Library Prize for Undergraduate Research is sponsored by the IU South Bend Library and Media Services, rewarding excellence in undergraduate research projects. A \$500 prize is given annually for the best undergraduate research project. The deadline for this year's Library Prize is February 1, 2010 and winners will be notified no later than March 15, 2010. If you are a faculty or staff member who has seen an excellent student research project in 2009 (and it does not need to be a research paper) please encourage him/her to apply.

The annual Library Prize is designed to honor students who demonstrate sophisticated research skill by incorporating information found through the library's resources into original scholarship. While consideration is given to the product of the research, the prize focuses on the research process and application of information literacy: the demonstration of library research skills, adept use of library resources, and the reflection upon the strategies utilized to investigate a research problem. Better World Books at IUSB

Better World Books (BWB) provides libraries with the opportunity to recycle gift materials that are not added to the collection, and make a small profit for the library in the process. BWB takes unwanted gift materials from libraries and offers them for sale through 17 online marketplaces, including their own website at www.BetterWorld.com. In partnering with BWB, the Schurz Library receives 15% of net proceeds from the sale of materials sent to BWB. BWB also supports four literacy agencies and asks the partnering library to select one of the four to receive 5% of the net proceeds. Schurz Librarians and Professional Staff selected the National Center for Family Literacy (NSFL) a literacy program that helps families in the US acquire literacy skills.

BWB was established in 2003 by students from Notre Dame. Its primary distribution center is located in Mishawaka, Indiana. Described on their web site as a for-profit socially and environmentally minded venture that has successfully diverted more than 13,000 tons of books from landfills and distributed over 7 million to hundreds of literacy partners, libraries, and educational service clubs.

To assist with receiving book donations for the library, Better World Book collection bins are located on the first floor of Northside Hall and the second floor of Wiekamp Hall. Alison Stankrauff was elected the Chair of the Society of American Archivists Lone Arrangers Roundtable. "Lone arrangers" are archivists who work in an archival repository where they are the only archivist. She was also nominated to be the Co-Chair of Program Committee for the 2011 Midwest Archives Conference, to be held in St. Paul, Minnesota. Locally, she was asked to be a part of the Civil Rights Heritage Center's Collections Committee, which, among other things, seeks to digitize the Center's collections that document local activism in Michiana's civil rights movement.

Rosanne Cordell was elected a director of the Intellectual Freedom Roundtable. Cordell was also selected as a contributor to the Guide to Reference which is the American Library Association's new online version of the venerable *Guide to Reference Books*.

Nancy Wootton Colborn has been appointed to the LOEX Advisory Board for a three-year term (2009-12). LOEX is an international organization that serves as a conduit for those working in the field of Library Instruction and Information Literacy. The Advisory Board consists of 7 members who are leaders in library instruction and are appointed by the LOEX Director.

Jim Yocom, Director of Instructional Media Services and Dr. Marianne C. Bishop, Instructional Strategist in the University Center for Excellence in Teaching, presented "Designing and Evaluating Student Multimedia Projects in an Online Environment" at the 25th Annual Conference on Distance Teaching & Learning in Madison, WI. The presentation included a discussion of best practices in development of assignments, resources, and methods of evaluation of multimedia project work.
